Guidance

Children and young people across the country have experienced unprecedented disruption to their education as a result of coronavirus (COVID 19). Those from the most vulnerable and disadvantaged backgrounds will be among the hardest hit. The aggregate impact of lost time in education will be substantial, and the scale of our response must match the scale of the challenge. Special school's allocations will be calculated on a per pupil basis, providing each special school with a total of £240 for each pupil. As the catch up premium has been designed to mitigate the effects of the unique disruption caused by coronavirus (COVID 19), the grant will only be available for the 2020 – 2021 academic year. It will not be added to schools' baselines in calculating future years' funding allocations.

Use Funding	EEF Recommendations
Schools should use funding for specific activities to support their pupils to catch up for lost teaching over the previous months, in line with the guidance on curriculum expectations for the next academic year. Schools have flexibility to spend their funding in the best way for the cohort and circumstances. To support schools to make the best use of this funding, the Education Endowment Foundation (EEF) has published a coronavirus (COVID 19) support guide for schools with evidence-based approaches to catch up for all students. Schools should use this document to help them direct their additional funding in the most effective way. Additional Resources to create bespoke learning packs for students	Some students find accessing online materials difficult, some students need real life objects to explore alongside the online learning experience. These packs contained materials to enable the students to continue to work on their SALT and OT programmes and contained personalised learning activities that correlated to their IEP and Long term targets.	£6000	Class teams created highly personalised home learning packs which contained a variety of resources tailored to meet the learning needs of the student.
Resources to create multi-sensory story packs	Online resources for our students working on the sensory curriculum are not appropriate. Teachers created sensory stories that were recorded and parents were given Packs with real life objects and a script that they could use with their child	£3000	Students working on the sensory curriculum were able to enjoy sensory experiences which helped build on their communication and engagement skills.
'Reading eggs' license was purchased	When students were re baselined it was evident that many students had regressed in reading. This package was chosen as it could be used both in school and at home by students.	£792	Students could have access to an interactive programme to help improve their reading at a level that was appropriate to them. Teachers could continue to track the students' progress.
More a reading books purchased for the school library	Students were assessed on the reading scheme that had been introduced at school. Books were purchased and staff worked on adapting them to ensure they were accessible for all students.	£6000	Students working above P4 will all be assessed and accessing reading materials in line with the Oaklands identified reading scheme. By having more books available more students will be able to bring books home and continue to work on improving their reading skills outside of school.
Keyboarding without tears licenses and equipment purchased	Students showed regression in writing during the analysis of rebase lining. Keyboarding without tears had been piloted in the school before lockdown	£4000	Students writing schools would improve, they would have a programme that they could use both in school and at home to generalise their skills.



Dansicality and PT sessions for sixth form students	A number of students in our sixth form had lost stamina after returning to school after a period of lockdown. Extra-curricular activities they used to access had now ceased. Students were showing decreased levels of engagement in lessons especially towards the afternoon.	£7,800	By having access to a number of motivating physical activities throughout the week students would regain motivation and increase their stamina. We hope to see an improvement in engagement as a result of this.
Additional sensory equipment purchased for use in the PMLD classrooms	Students were not able to share equipment due to the risk of cross infection.	£5,400	Students are still able to have access to sensory experiences that are motivating and engaging for them.
